





Blame for Poor South-North Relations



North to Blame: By Age









Attitudes on *Unconditional* Economic Aid: By Age








U.S. Favorability: By Age




North Korea Favorability: By Age






China as Threat: By Ideology




China Intervention in 2nd Korean War



China's Intervention *Less Likely*: By Age




Japan as Threat: By Ideology








