Talking Points for: Kazuhiko Togo, Director, Institute for World Affairs, Kyoto Sangyo

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 2012 incidents: immediate outcome: China seems to have gained things it wanted and Japan seems to have made a gigantic diplomatic failure unprecedented in many decades.

- 2. There is a real danger that the failed Japan would elect a new government which would resort to actions that only exacerbate the situation. See the Liberal Democratic Party Platform No. 132.
- 3. Are both China and Japan not losing a historic opportunity to create both a new civilization, both bearing its rich historical culture and experience, and both envisaging a transparent and accountable power to be accepted and respected in the age of globalization?
- 4. What should be done as immediate measures to prevent the situation to worsen?

  Both sides should engage in a dialogue without pre-conditions; Japan should voluntarily take measures of not landing, not researching and not constructing; China should voluntarily refrain from sending official ships into the territorial waters.
